



Claude Hurtubise founded his publishing house in 1960, on the eve of the Quiet Revolution. Against a backdrop of intellectual and cultural upheaval, the publisher worked to promote new literary voices including those of Anne Hébert, Jacques Ferron, Guy Rocher and many more.

Sixty years later, Groupe HMH represents four publishing houses (XYZ, MultiMondes, MD, and Hurtubise) along with a distribution structure to publish 140 – 150 titles annually, including works of fiction and nonfiction, children's literature, books for general audiences, and educational resources. The Groupe also co-owns Bibliothèque québécoise, a publisher that specializes in re-publishing classic and contemporary Quebec literature in paperback.

Groupe HMH maintains a vast literary scope out of a desire to create opportunity and think outside the box. It has cultivated an international presence over the past several decades by participating in major book fairs and trade missions. The Groupe is also a visionary on several fronts including the audio book industry, for which it now produces content. Today, HMH is recognized as a leader in the French-Canadian publishing market.

After And the Birds Rained Down (2011), an international bestseller and winner of several literary prizes that has been translated into fifteen languages and adapted for film last year, XYZ is back with Jocelyne Saucier's latest title, published this fall as À train perdu. This season, the Groupe is delighted to welcome Montreal mayor Valérie Plante to its team, whose debut graphic novel Simone Simoneau underscores the importance of citizen engagement in politics and will be published simultaneously in English by D+Q. The book features magnificent illustrations by Delphie Côté-Lacroix, who received a 2019 Governor General's Award for Jack et le temps perdu, available in English from Greystone Books in October 2020.

As for MultiMondes, after the success of *Le Cerveau et la musique* (2018), Michel Rochon is back with a new title on neuroscience: *L'amour, la haine et le cerveau* takes a fascinating look at how to manage the contradictory impulses that dictate humans' ability to adapt to a constantly changing environment.

Up-and-coming authors Marie-Christine Chartier (*Le sommeil des loutres*) and Sophie Laurin (*En route vers nowhere*) bring a breath of fresh air and romance to Hurtubise this summer with chart-topping new releases that have resounded with a large, primarily female audience nostalgic for a time when love led to new adventures.

INTERNATIONAL TRANSLATION GRANTS

CANADA COUNCIL FOR THE ARTS

The "translation" component of Arts Abroad funds the translation of Canadian dramatic works or literary works for international presentation or publication.

Types of writing covered by the funding

Translation funding is available for fiction and short stories, poetry, drama, graphic novels, children's and YA literature, and literary non-fiction.

Amount of funding

Up to 50% of translation costs and a maximum of CA\$20,000 for each translation. Each applicant is eligible to receive up to two translation grants per year. Costs are calculated based on translation fees.

SODEC

SODEC provides financial assistance for the translation of literary works written by Québec authors and published by Québec publishers. This program aims at providing visibility for Québec authors and literature throughout exportation and international rights markets.


Amount of funding

The request for funds must be submitted to SODEC by a Québec publisher. The subsidy granted may be up to 75% of the translator's fee and up to a total amount of CA\$12,500.

Maybe then her parents wouldn't make fun of her eating habits at family dinners, the girls at school wouldn't call her ugly, and the boy she likes would ask her out. This all-too-relatable memoir follows Marie-Noëlle from childhood to her twenties, as she navigates what it means to be born into a body that doesn't fall within society's beauty standards.

When, as a young teen, Marie-Noëlle begins a fitness regime in an effort to change her body, her obsession with her weight and size only grows and she begins having suicidal thoughts. Fortunately for Marie-Noëlle, a friend points her in the direction of therapy, and slowly, she begins to realize that she doesn't need the approval of others to feel whole.

MARIE-NOËLLE HÉBERT lives in Montreal. Largely self-taught, she studied advertising illustration at Collège Salette. 

Every subject of this book has been handpicked and thoroughly researched. The topics are inspired by questions that readers of *Le Soleil* have sent to the author over the years.



These days, woodland caribou and beluga whales like to keep a low profile. When an entire species is wiped out, it takes with it a particular way of using the Earth and disrupts the organization of all living matter it touches. Forever.

For more than a century, research has shown that ecosystem cohesion, productivity and stability are dependent upon the interconnectivity of living organisms. In other words, we can't save woodland caribou if we ravage their forests or preserve beluga if we destroy their home in the Saint-Laurent.

We must re-examine our nature conservation strategies and overhaul our largely obsolete existing environmental regulations. We must recognize that nature, like humans, has rights of its own. Only then can we adequately address the issues threatening ecosystems: the invasion of new species, destruction of habitats caused by pollution, impacts of climate change and reckless exploitation of resources.

MICHEL LEBOEUF is a biologist and spent ten years as editor-in-chief of the Quebec journal Nature sauvage. He has written over a dozen books and was twice awarded the prix Hubert-Reeves for best popular science book in Quebec.

NECESSARY IRRATIONALITY



Descartes wasn't wrong when he wrote "I think, therefore I am." The problem, however, lies in an abuse of reason. What if, by resorting to rational logic to build our societies—their pedagogical approaches, medical system and relationship to science and mystery—we have willingly donned blinders out of fear? What if we have lost an essential, irrational part of ourselves?

In this plea for a world that leaves space for poetry and intuition, Jean Désy calls on intellectual thinkers in science as well as the arts and humanities. His arguments draw on figures such as Carl Jung, Plato, Clarice Lispector, Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, Simone Weil, Anna Arendt, Max Planck and Lao Tzu.

JEAN DÉSY has a degree in philosophy, practices medicine, teaches literature to future doctors and has published numerous literary works. He splits his time between the South and Northern Quebec, writing and teaching, practicing medicine and literature. He has published over 15 titles with Éditions XYZ.



Désy invites the reader to engage with these cultural icons and dare to reimagine our relationship with reality.







Rodeo is inspired by real events that shook Northern France. The rich narrative will appeal to those who enjoy language that is luminous and raw.

After studying art history and archaeology, AÏKO SOLOVKINE decided to become a freelance journalist. Written over evenings and completed in only three months, her debut novel *Rodeo* won the 2016 Prix de la première oeuvre awarded by the Fédération Wallonie-Bruxelles. First published by Filipson, it was republished in 2020 in Europe by Espace Nord and XYZ for the North American market.

THE REAWAKENING


Trois réveils Catherine Perrin

A novel whose singular score follows the emotional roller-coaster of a young man pulled by invisible threads, a bipolar protagonist whose moods, described with rare art and science, are skilfully rendered through the music he listens to.

Antoine is studying at the Conservatoire de musique when, shortly after he discovers the oboe, he has his first manic episode that leads to a psychosis. He is medicated and the crisis is averted — until a relapse brings on a survivalist obsession and growing isolation. Then comes the accident, the climax of his fall.

Once life has calmed down again, Antoine must find a reason to continue. He has to rekindle an interest in life while agreeing to "sacrifice a flamboyant part of himself, to keep it under chemical control. In exchange, he asks only for peace." And those around him must come to terms with the reality: his ever-worried sister; his best friend and opera virtuoso; his father, whom he must one day learn to forgive.

After eight years hosting a daily radio show, the harpsichordist and broadcaster CATHERINE PERRIN turned to writing — though she does not stray far from her love of music. Written with perceptiveness and great sensitivity, her first novel addresses art — and the people you meet in the street.



Every once in a while, someone lingers a bit as he plays in the metro. In those moments, Antoine can tell the music has touched a life; he is playing for this particular listener, even while others stream past. The music changes and beyond the mechanics, there is an almost animal desire to do good.



While the author's first novel questioned the frenetic pace of urban lifestyles, this time the lens is turned to excessive hunting practices that serve the market for fast-fashion.

Anouk, the narrator of *Gimme Shelter*, returns as a secondary character as a love story gradually develops between her and Raphaëlle. The author's imagery and poetic voice furthers the dramatic intrigue and keeps readers on tenterhooks.

The "wild ones" are Raphaëlle and Anouk, two women who chose to settle in the Kamouraska forest, Raphaëlle to be among animals and Anouk in search of solitude for writing. A common enemy will bring them together: a dangerous poacher, a threat to both the women and the animals.

In order to survive and protect the region and the life it hosts, they will have to turn the violent traps against the hunter himself.

GABRIELLE FILTEAU-CHIBA lives in a solar-powered house on the banks of the Kamouraska River. She writes, translates, illustrates and defends the natural beauty of her adoptive region. She is working on a third novel for 2021.
